

Mississippi Storms



Devastating storms and at least one tornado has ripped through rural Mississippi leaving at least 26 people dead and dozens injured. First responders raced against time to rescue people from the rubble. The tornado's death toll now ranks as the highest in Mississippi this century and the worst in over 50 years, cutting a path of devastation 100 miles long and a mile wide with debris being thrown 30,000 feet into the air. Along its track few buildings remained unaffected, many are completely demolished, those remaining will require extensive repairs, and more severe storms are expected.

LCIF is mobilizing a US\$50,000 MCAT grant to Lions to deliver tornado disaster relief to District 30-M in Mississippi in addition to the US\$10,000 emergency grant to start addressing immediate needs. When a humanitarian crisis of this magnitude strikes, we, as Lions, are ready to help. The purpose of the grant is to cover immediate needs.

Turkey/Syrian Earthquake



After the devastating earthquake struck Turkey and Syria Lions and Lions International responded by providing assistance to families who were left homeless. The Turkish media has named this earthquake "The Disaster of the Century" with 11 large urban areas and 30 small urban areas destroyed with aftershocks continuing.

Approximately 14 million people have been affected with over 1.2 million left homeless. There have been around 50,000 casualties and 120,000 injured.

The LCIF Turkish Disaster Relief Committee have reported that 11 provinces have been affected with Lions focusing on 4 areas of greatest need: Antakya, Kahramanmaras, Malatya and Adiyaman where the focus will now be on rebuilding.

Cash donations to LCIF are preferred over donations of items as the items most required can be purchased locally, often cheaper than what can be bought in other countries. Local materials are more suited for the environment and the logistics of storage and distribution are overcome. The disaster has brought an increase in smuggling, which has led to long delays in customs.

Disaster relief transitions through three stages;

- Immediate needs; food, water, shelter and hygiene are crucial in this stage.
- Supporting stabilised populations: in temporary housing and with services
- Rebuilding

LCIF will continue to support this crisis as long as there is interest from local Lions and funds are available. The first Major Catastrophe Grant for this disaster was for US\$200,000 and nearly US\$180,000 of that has been spent. The LCIF general Disaster Relief fund has allowed the foundation to respond quickly to this disaster as with others in the past.

Donations have been received from 44 different countries and have exceeded US\$1,000,000. MD 105 (The British Isles) have donated over US\$107,955.

Ukraine Displaced Persons – United Through Kindness



The conflict in Ukraine has driven millions of people from their homes (over 6 million refugees have had to leave Ukraine, 90% are women and children) This has created a humanitarian crisis that is forcing families to search for safety and security. In this time of great need,



Lions Club International Foundation (LCIF) has awarded grants to make sure Lions are there to help provide immediate relief to those struggling to meet their most basic needs, and Lions around the world are uniting through kindness to help the people who desperately need it.

The grant funding has enabled Lions to cover a broad spectrum of refugee needs, including immediate survival needs, transitional needs for mid- or long-term settlement, and support for services to help refugees integrate into their new community.

LCIF have also awarded grants to Lions supporting Ukrainian refuges who have crossed their borders. Lions in Ukraine have also received LCIF grants to address the critical needs of people who remain in the country.

To date over 62 grants have been approved by LCIF totalling in excess of US\$4,177,532.

How can you help these needs?

To support Lions in their efforts to help those impacted by these disasters and others yet to come, donations can be made to LCIF Disaster Relief and can be made via our District Treasurer.

This Veterans club is so popular now, with 60 attending that day, they are looking for bigger premises. We are proud to support such an amazing group of people.



Marie Curie Daffodil Appeal Collections



Who doesn't like a silly hat!! We all enjoy collecting for the Marie Curie Daffodil Appeal and will happily put on the silly hats and carry the silk daffodil pin trays to support this very worthwhile cause. We collected in Morrisons Waterglade in Clacton town centre for one day and the new Morrisons in Little Clacton for two



days. Somehow this year it became a friendly battle of the sexes. I hate to admit it but the men collected more than the women. Our grand total for the 3 days was £1,154.93 but we managed to scrape together another 7p so it was £1,155.00 A great result.

Recycling goes from strength to strength

We have 40 recycling bins located in Tendring, mainly in opticians but some chemists and doctors sugeries have them too. We collect spectacles, hearing aids, printer cartridges and mobile phones in them (as well as the occasional sweet paper and bits of rubbish). In the last 12 months we have collected the fantastic amount of 36,000 pairs of spectacles which are all on the long journey to give the gift of sight to those in need and 512 hearing aids have been sent to be rehomed. We have



also handed over 4,000 printer cartridges to East Anglian Children's Hospices worth an estimated £6,000 to their funds plus 650 mobile phones worth an estimated £8,250 to them once broken up. Old batteries are taken to the local recycling bins in B&Q and we have a contact at Clacton Hospital who finds new homes for unused, in date hearing aid batteries. 
