

Lions and Lionesses took part in the parade, marching to the War Memorial where they joined hundreds of local people for a Remembrance Service in Swaffham. ## Wisbech Action.



Wisbech came together for the annual Remembrance Day parade on Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> November 2019. The traditional march past and parade attracted a huge crowd. The parade through the town concluded at the war memorial where there was a service and two-minute silence.

Organisations from across Wisbech and beyond then stepped forward to lay wreaths at the memorial. This year, the honour of laying the wreath for Wisbech Lions Club fell to Lion President Marilyn Batrick accompanied by Vice President Alan Edmunds. Many members of the Wisbech Lions Club were also in attendance.

Luke Hayes is 13 years old. In September he was crowned UK Windsurfing Association National Boy's champion, despite only taking up the sport a year ago.

He got interested in the sport through his membership of Wisbech Sea Cadets. He has been with them since he was 10 years old. It seems he went to the championships at Graffham Water, Huntingdon to gain experience. He surpassed expectations. He had already won two regional medals in the Midlands. Over the weekend he competed against 200 other hopeful competitors in 10 races. He steadily saw off the challenges and rose from 14<sup>th</sup>, to sixth and finally second place. He was the first boy overall.



The championships are part of the process of selection for the Zone Squad, a part of the pathway to possible Olympic selection. Luke has attended weekly team sessions with sea cadets at Thrapston and has taken part in Royal Yacht Association training. He has the determination and support of the Wisbech Sea Cadets and his mother Nicola to make his way to the Great Britain Olympic team. Like Eddie the Eagle, he is a young man with a dream. Luke hopes to raise £2500 sponsorship to help purchase a new windsurfing board, clothing and accessories.

On Tuesday 19<sup>th</sup> November, members of Wisbech Lions visited the Sea Cadets where Vice President Alan Edmunds presented Luke with £300 for appropriate clothing. The Regional Chair, Lion Paul Southerton from Kings Lynn Lions Club was at the club meeting where the application was raised. As Luke lived in the catchment for Kings Lynn Lions he has since had agreement for their club to pledge £300 towards a new board.

Luke was very thankful and asked that he display the International Lions Club logo on his clothing and equipment. He is a keen user of Instagram and has a 'Facebook' page. Lion Alan said, "This is an excellent way for our club members to encourage our young people to be active, competitive and respectful. We wish Luke great success over the coming years and are confident he will be a great advocate of the Lions organization.

## 'Lions pick a Pumpkin Patch'

As part of District 105CE's work towards alleviating hunger, District 105CE and MD Hunger Officer Lion Chris Hibbert has been working with Feedback Global to set up our own Lions Gleaning Hub.

Gleaning is a term used to describe collecting and redistributing perfectly edible and nutritious fruit and vegetables from farms and orchards that would otherwise go to waste.

Members of East Anglia New Century Lions Club and Peterborough Lions Club weighed in to 'squash food waste' on Saturday 2<sup>nd</sup> November 2019 at Hill Farm, Peterborough. In just two and a half hours the eight volunteers collected approximately 5 tonnes of pumpkins and squashes. Due to poor weather over the previous weeks this Pick Your Own (PYO) farm was left with huge amounts of produce that was going to be ploughed into the ground.

The following weekend saw East Anglia New Century Lions Club out again gleaning more pumpkins and squashes, this time with help from Chelmsford Lions and Leos. This event took place at Foxes Farm Produce near Basildon where eight tonne bags were filled with an estimated 6 tonnes of food.

The produce from both gleans was distributed across our Multiple District via the Fareshare network to 14 of their depots from Newcastle upon Tyne, Liverpool and Manchester in the north to Brighton, Ipswich and Deptford in the south.

Each year it is estimated that 18,000 tonnes of pumpkins are sent to landfill, which is predominantly due to carving pumpkins. We don't want to stop this activity, but we do want to encourage the edible parts to be eaten and the remainder to be composted.

This is not just a hunger issue; it's an environmental issue too. It is estimated that for every 1 tonne of food waste diverted from landfill 0.5t of CO<sub>2</sub> is saved from entering the atmosphere. If

food waste was a country it would be the third highest CO<sub>2</sub> emitter after China and the USA.

Pumpkins are not the only produce to be wasted. It is estimated that the average family throw away produce worth £700 each year by wasting food that could have been eaten.

Thanks, must go to Feedback <https://feedbackglobal.org/> for their help and advice organising our first two gleans, to Fareshare UK <https://fareshare.org.uk/> for distributing the pumpkins and to the farmers for allowing us onto their farms to glean these edible delights.

The volunteers were encouraged to take a few pumpkins and squashes home and to create and share the recipes they created. These will be used in the future to help to educate the public on better ways to use their pumpkins. **IMPORTANT MESSAGE REGARDING  
SENDING SPECTACLES TO  
CHICHESTER**



We have during the past year received complaints from Parcel Force about the way that boxes are packed as many of them are splitting open in the vans or at the depot. Also, many boxes are not packed to capacity which means that they collapse on stacking. Please can you ensure that the boxes used are made of sturdy cardboard and are packed to the top without using other materials such as newspaper or polythene.

Boxes should be of a good size (shoe boxes are much too small!) and must not weigh more than 10 kg. Please do not call Parcel Force out for single boxes, please wait until you have several boxes before you ring them to cut their costs. Remember that they provide this service free of charge.

Spectacles should be packed loose and not wrapped individually or put into plastic bags. Please do not send cases, cleaning clothes, loose lenses, or contact lenses.

For clubs that bring their spectacles to us of course you can continue to drop them off in boxes or sacks but please remove the items as listed above.

**Please not send or bring any spectacles in December or the first 2 weeks in January.**
